The Lancer girls varsity basketball team led the way this past week with a pair of victories to add to their record. The varsity boys and the seventh grade boys each notched a win as well.

Playing at home on Dec. 6, the varsity girls cruised to a win over Indiana Math and Science Academy, 57-20, to improve to 5-4 on the season. Alyssa Funkhouser was the Lancers' top scorer with 17, Gracie Crawhorn added 14, Callie Hancock 11, Kyah Streeval six, Mia Dodson four, Bethany Burton three and Cloee Britton two.

That same evening, had the middle school Lancer boys on the road to South Decatur to take on the Cougars.

The opening contest saw Edinburgh come out on top of a close one, 32-30, led by Cayper Ison's 20 points. Xavier Suns added eight, and Ayden Swallows four. The win brought them to 3-4 on the year.

In the second game, the eighth grade lost to the Cougars, 56-37, to drop to 2-5. Bailey Totten put up 20 to pace the Lancers. Cayper Ison added eight, Ayden Swallows five, Braylon Lenkner two and Xavier Suns two.

Thursday saw the middle school boys playing a single, combined game at Morristown due to illness in both schools. Having seventh graders play up wasn't anything new for the Lancers but it didn't help on this occasion, as they fell to the Yellow Jackets, 39-18. Xavier Suns led the way here scoring seven, Cayper Ison five, Samson Parkhurst three and Matthew Burton three.

Things were quiet until Saturday when Lancer Arena hosted three games on the day. Starting at noon, the varsity girls played Milan and, after the first period, were in control the remainder of the game in their 43-34 win. Gracie Crawhorn led the good guys with 13 points, Alyssa Funkhouser scored 11, Callie Hancock nine, Bethany Burton six, Gracie Myers two and Cloee Britton two.

The North Decatur Chargers came to town that evening for a key MHC match-up in high school boys basketball.

C4 students create annual holiday card to support programs

A team of high school students are giving Santa and his elves a run for their money by using design skills, technology and a good old-fashioned assembly line to spread some cheer.

In keeping with an annual tradition, students in the C4 Columbus Area Career Connection program have created just more than 200 holiday cards this year, said graphic design teacher Jeff Metz. The cards go to teachers and administrators from participating county schools, community members who help support C4 programs, and some retired teachers.

While Metz doesn't recall exactly how the annual project began, he said that the first C4 holiday card was pretty simplistic. Now, however, the festive creations are "more complex," thanks to the help of a laser engraver.

However, before that comes into play, the project begins with a design phase. Metz said that about 35 students submitted designs for the cards, and C4 administrators chose one created by Columbus North sophomore Faline Fox.

The completed card shows a holiday

scene with snowman next to bridge, a few buildings in the background, and Santa flying overhead with his reindeer and sleigh as it snows.

"Mr. Metz told us that we had to do a 3D project, and I remembered how my mom would always get these really pretty cards that would be like a box with a scene inside of it," Faline said. She decided to follow that style but do a more simplified version.

Creating the design was the most challenging part of the project for her, as she

had to get it done in a short amount of time. It didn't help that her computer crashed twice in the process.

After her design was chosen, Faline tweaked it as needed. Once the design was completely finished, students used the laser engraver to cut out pieces for the project and then assembled a few cards at a time, going back to the engraver to cut

out more pieces as needed.

In addition to designing the card, Faline worked with the laser engraver on the project and also helped a little with gluing the cards together.

Metz said that all of the students who worked on the cards were from the Graphic Design and Layout and Graphic Imaging Technology classes with 37 submitted designs. About 20 of those same students worked on engraving, folding, gluing and stuffing the cards. Faline said that Metz also took some time to help with the project.

"I think my favorite part has been just assembling the cards, because I've gotten to talk to people," she said. "And also, I think this part (the interview) right now, because I feel like I'm getting recognition for my work, which is cool."

Metz said that students enjoy the project each year. He noted that it gives them not just a chance to learn about design principles but also an opportunity to give back to the community.

"I hope they get a kind of sense of community, truly," he said.

State winding down refugee donation efforts

A statewide donation effort for Afghan refugees being temporarily housed at Camp Atterbury is winding down.

But Camp Atterbury's Rail Deployment Facility — which Team Rubicon is operating out of — will continue to accept donations until the end of January. The facility is located at 5921 Schoolhouse Road, Edinburgh.

The outpouring of support for Afghans temporarily housed in Indiana has led to a surplus of some items, and existing donations are expected to meet the needs of tens of thousands of refugees who are being resettled across the United States, Indiana officials said. Atterbury, which is expected to house refugees through the end of January, had received more than 1.6 million items as part of the statewide program as of Dec. 1. Data from donation efforts at other sites indicates Indiana was a national leader in support of the refugee mission, according to the news release.

Atterbury officials are working to establish a clearinghouse of the remaining items to help support Indiana resettlement agencies. More than 300 Afghans have been resettled in Indiana as of Dec. 1, and 700 more will likely be resettled in the coming weeks, the news release said.

Right now, refugees at Atterbury are most in need of items such as wallets, shoes, bras, fingernail clippers, personal hygiene items and activity items like crochet supplies, games, books and toys, according to the news release.

More Hoosier teens eligible for Pfizer boosters

State health officials have opened Pfizer booster shots to Hoosiers age 16 and 17. Teens must have received their second dose of the Pfizer vaccine at least six months ago to be eligible for a booster.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) approved the administration of a booster dose of the Pfizer vaccine for individuals 16 and older following the Food and Drug Administration's decision to expand its Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) to include individuals ages 16 and 17.

Hoosiers 18 and older may get any of the three COVID-19 vaccines as a booster dose six months following their second dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine or after the single-dose Johnson and Johnson vaccine.

Hoosiers aged 16 and 17 are only eligible for a Pfizer booster shot.
