Custom apparel business grows into new building

Not quite a year ago, the lobby at 111 E. Center Cross consisted of bare walls, a hodgepodge of decades-old tile and cement floors with hints of faded paint.

A light fixture dangled from the bare ceiling joists and random electrical conduits jutted out of the walls. Built in 1946, the two-story brick structure that originally housed the Hardin Motors De Soto &

Plymouth dealership was now home to DMB Embroidery, a long time Edinburgh business owned by Laura Burton.

In 2008, Burton, who was a mortgage originator, found herself unemployed due to the national financial crisis that year. She and her husband, Mike Burton, already owned an embroidery machine and with the purchase of an existing screen-printing business, the couple started operating out of their garage. They decided to name the business DMB Embroidery after their first-born son, Dillon Michael Burton, who passed away at the age of six months in 1993.

As the business grew, so did the need for space. In 2012, Burton moved DMB to a building they already owned and established the business as a limited liability company (LLC) that same year. Offering a wide variety of embroidery and screen-printing services, DMB provides both corporate and team apparel, and is the favorite local supplier of Lancer gear, event T-shirts and other custom work. The company also offers awards, trophies and medals.

The decision to purchase the East Center Cross building came as Burton's

Girls coach hits 100th win milestone; Palmeter recognized

Both the JV and varsity girls notched a victory this past week, the boys varsity added two wins to their record and a Lancer coach reached a nice milestone in her coaching career.

Starting on Dec. 13, the middle school boys teams played at Jennings County Middle School.

The seventh grade found themselves in a proverbial barn-burner but fell to the young Panthers, 33-31, to see their record slip to 3-5 on the season.

Cayper Ison led the Lancers with 12 points, Xavier Suns scored nine, Ayden Swallows six and Matthew Burton four.

In the evening's second game, the eighth grade boys lost to Jennings County, 47-20 to drop to 2-6.

After the game, congratulations went out to coach Amy Macy-Schilling. This victory was a sweet milestone on any coach's resume as it was the 100th of her coaching career.

It was the varsity boys turn on Friday night as they also hosted Hauser. The good guys led by eight after the first period and were never challenged the rest of the way as they decimated the Jets, 73-46.

vision for herself and her company continued to grow. Mike Burton had been encouraging his wife for three years to look at the shop saying, "the location, traffic flow and the size of the building was perfect for what we need."

In addition to adding new equipment and having showroom and sales space, she wants to eventually transition "from being an operator to being an owner," to better manage the overall business aspect of her company.

"I read an article about how if you're not careful, you will spend all of your time on small tasks," Burton said. "Sometimes, you get so caught up in the work, you don't get a good picture of which direction to go or where to save money."

Whether it's embroidering shirts, designing custom

graphics for a small business or meeting with customers, Burton enjoys it all, even though in the beginning it wasn't so easy.

"I remember standing in the garage saying, 'this isn't going to work,' because we didn't know a thing about screen printing. It was absurd learning all of that," she said.

Mike Burton, who helps with graphic design and technical work, said that the motto of DMB is "Our Goal is Your Satisfaction," and that his wife follows those words at any expense.

"Laura has always been in customer service and she is very good at controlling situations," he said. "She wants all customers happy and doesn't sleep at night if they aren't."

Burton is a great example of the many women in the Edinburgh community with successful businesses, although she didn't necessarily set out to become a woman-owned business. She hasn't completed the paperwork to become a certified woman-owned business, but it's defi-

nately on her to-do list. The possibilities of obtaining grants with that acknowledgement is especially inviting since securing financing for self-employed business owners is often difficult.

Ten months after the purchase of 111 E. Center Cross, the lobby of the former Hardin Motors has now been transformed into a stunning showroom and sales floor for DMB Embroidery, LLC. A new screen-printer was recently added to the line-up of apparel machinery, and the store front is open for business. However, the struggle of starting and maintaining a business throughout the last 13 years is not lost on Burton, who has learned much more than just the logistics of decorating apparel. It has given her a sense of pride for herself that she wants to share with others.

"I want to inspire and instill in young women and girls that having your own business isn't about a woman being powerful, but more about her own self-worth," Burton said.

Second pandemic-era Shop with a Cop is declared a hit

On a chilly and rainy December morning on Greenwood's west side, the Christmas wishes of several Johnson County children became a reality thanks to local police.

This year, nearly 45 children shopped in shifts at the Greenwood Meijer on State Road 135 during Shop with a Cop, the Johnson County Fraternal Order of Police's annual holiday event. The decision to do the shopping in shifts was due to a request from Meijer, said Evan Preston, a sheriff's deputy and county FOP board member.

About \$15,000 was raised for the fraternal order of police this year, and each kid was given about \$300 to spend on items they needed, such as winter coats, socks and boots, and some things they wanted, such as video games, scooters and Nerf guns.

Franklin brothers Blake and Zayden

Mudd were excited to go shopping with police officers. Blake, 8, teamed up with Franklin police officer Mary Helms, and Zayden, 9, went with Edinburgh police officer Randy Vandergrift.

Both Helms and Vandergrift walked the store with the brothers, helping them find the things they needed and wanted for Christmas.

Helms helped Blake find socks, try on a bicycle helmet and find what he considered the ultimate gift — a hover board. Blake stood in shock and excitement as a Meijer employee brought it out to him.

It's heartwarming, said Gava Mudd, Blake and Zayden's grandmother. She and her husband can't do it all for the kids, so Shop with a Cop is a true blessing, she said.

"I'm so thankful ... We are so blessed to be able to take part," Gava Mudd said.

Like Blake and Zayden, AJ Myers, 10, of Greenwood, was also excited to shop with police officers. Myers was able to shop with two law enforcement officers — Sheriff Duane Burgess and Probation

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Edinburgh schools moves forward with plans for tax-hike referendum

Edinburgh schools is moving forward with its plan to ask district residents to pay more in property taxes to fund additional certifications and teachers.

The school board initially considered a 40-cent tax hike for every \$100 of assessed property value, but settled on a 39-cent figure, as that was the smallest increase that would raise the \$700,000 needed each year to fund the district's goals, said Ron Ross, superintendent.

Programming improvements would include pursuing certification in science, technology, engineering and math — or STEM — at Edinburgh Community High

School and Edinburgh Community Middle School, to join East Side Elementary School, which is already STEM certified. The district would also hire a teacher for English language learners.

Now, district leaders will have conversations with auditors in Bartholomew and Johnson counties, who will review the percentage and finances behind it. It will then head to the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance, which will review the exact wording of the referendum question. Once the referendum question and exact proposed tax hike are finalized by those two entities, the school board will vote, likely in January, on whether to put it on the May 2022 election ballot, Ross said.

The tax hike would affect voters in Blue River and German Townships, and would raise an estimated \$701,590 each year. The owner of a \$96,800 home, which is the

median home value in the district, would pay an additional \$9.97 a month, while the owner of a \$200,000 home would pay an additional \$31.77. All figures are estimates from Baker Tilly U.S. LLP, a Chicago-based public accounting and consulting firm.

Other successful referendums, such as those at Clark-Pleasant and Franklin schools, cover an eight-year time frame, after which the property tax hike ceases.

Because property values in Edinburgh are less than they are in Franklin, for example, and fewer people live in Edinburgh, a greater percentage property tax hike is needed to raise the amount of money that is needed. Franklin schools has \$4.4 million of referendum money to work with next year from a 23-cent tax hike. At Clark-Pleasant schools, a 10-cent tax hike will raise about \$2.1 million next year.

WindRose plans \$3.5M expansion in Franklin

WindRose Health Network plans to nearly double the size of its Franklin clinic and bring new services to the city.

The \$3.5 million project is supported by more than \$714,400 from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), a COVID-19 relief bill passed earlier this year. ARPA provided a wide variety of relief funds including payments to individuals and capital project funding for local governments and federally qualified health care providers such as WindRose.

WindRose has served Johnson County since 1996, when its first clinic opened in Trafalgar. The Franklin clinic opened in 2004 at 55 N. Milford Drive. When the company acquired the building, it was small but was big enough for the number of patients at the time. In the years since, Franklin has grown, and so has the number of patients. Due to its proximity to Interstate 65, the center draws patients from surrounding areas such as Whiteland, Edinburgh and Columbus, said

Scott Rollett, the company's president and CEO.

The increase in patients led to a need for more space, he said.

Patients, especially people who are more comfortable speaking Spanish, are drawn to the clinic because WindRose has Spanish-speaking staff available to help them, Rollett said. About 40% of WindRose patients speak English as a second language, including the Chin population on the southside of Indianapolis, and Hispanic people across Johnson, Marion and Bartholomew counties.

The company owns three acres at its Franklin site, but the building takes up about half the lot, so there is room to grow. The expansion will be built as a 6,190-square-foot free-standing addition connected to its 7,310-square-foot building with an enclosed walkway.

The new building will include a new waiting area, an onsite pharmacy, 15 exam rooms, four health care provider pods, three private offices, a lab area and a procedure room. There will be 62 additional parking spaces and a drive-thru for the pharmacy, according to WindRose's application for funding.

The new facility will also bring new jobs,

including care coordinators, clinical pharmacists, community health workers, behavioral health providers and substance abuse counselors, according to the application.

The new pharmacy will give WindRose the opportunity to provide at-cost drugs to the community through the federal 340B Drug Pricing Program. The program enables qualifying health care providers to buy and sell prescription drugs at cost and without a retail mark-up. That saves patients, especially those who are uninsured, a significant amount of money, Rollett said.

WindRose is also seeing growth at its other clinics, and plans to add on to the Hope clinic in a few years, he said.

Construction will start on the Franklin addition in the spring, and it is expected to open in June 2023.

Once the new addition opens, the company plans to add basic imaging services and new types of health care in its existing building. Plans for the building aren't set in stone, but the hope is to provide a more holistic health care experience in that space, Rollett said.
