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New housing development at Timbergate in limbo

crowd of about 30 people cheered as a proposal to shrink lot sizes and square footage in Edinburgh's Timbergate subdivision was denied Jan. 10.

The subdivision at Timbergate Golf Course has been under construction for 24 years, with about 67 home lots sold so far, but the development process has been much slower than expected.

The biggest year for homes sales in the subdivision was in 2021 when 10 lots were sold, said Wade Watson, Edinburgh planning director.

The development project is still active as several homes are under construction. But Michigan-based Amos Investment Corporation, the original developer, is seeking to sell the undeveloped land to another developer.

Gradison Land Development, of Indianapolis, and Virginia homebuilder Ryan Homes were seeking to take over the development of the final two sections of Timbergate. But the Edinburgh Plan Commission and the Edinburgh Town Council both disagreed with changes to development standards the companies proposed.

The development was zoned planned unit development, or PUD, 24 years ago. A PUD allows for special zoning standards that are specific to the developer's vision for a property. For Timbergate that includes large lot sizes, landscaping, streets lined with trees and all-brick homes.

In October the plan commission renewed the PUD for another five years but gave the proposed changes to the PUD an unfavorable recommendation. That proposal

would have decreased lot sizes and home square footage, and allowed fiber cement siding on up to 75% of home exteriors, town documents show.

The plan commission made that decision in front of a crowd of over 60 residents after hearing comments from neighbors who want to see the current standards continue, according to minutes from the meeting.

Interest in the proposal continued when about 30 residents attended the town council meeting, which was held in the Edinburgh Community High School cafeteria due to the anticipated crowd. Residents again called for the standards to continue.

Several said those standards are why those have chosen to make their home in

the development. Others were concerned that views of fiber cement-sided homes on smaller lots would lower the reputation of the golf course.

Representatives from Gradison emphasized the homes were a good product that is selling well in Johnson County and Indianapolis. The homes would have been similar to houses with an average sale price of \$325,000 in the Briar Creek and Briar Estates neighborhoods in Whiteland, said Ryan Mears, an attorney representing Gradison.

Gradison would have invested more than \$9 million to prepare the lots for development. With that level of investment, the





HANGING IN THE BALANCE Amity fire department hopes to buy life-saving CPR machine

ith a life hanging in the balance, first responders found themselves equipped with an extra pair of hands.

The Amity Community Volunteer Fire Department responded to a patient in full cardiac arrest. The patient had no heartbeat and needed to be revived. Just days prior, the department had received an ingenious

The device, known as a LUCAS CPR machine, allowed the first responders to focus on getting blood pressure, check for other injuries and do other interventions on the patient.

"It took us seconds to get this set up, and then minutes into the clock, medics had her back," said Spenser Hunter, assistant chief of the Amity Volunteer Fire Department.

Ĥaving seen the impact of the device, Amity fire officials are working to raise money for a unit of their own. They hope to join a number of departments within Johnson County — including those in White River Township, Bargersville and Trafalgar — that can be employed during rescue runs.

Amity is raising the \$14,000 needed to buy the machine. Though the price is steep, they see it as a small cost for the potential to save lives.

"I've been in the fire service since 1975, and this is probably one of the biggest advances I've seen," said Jackie Brockman, fire chief of the Amity department. "I personally think that every fire department should have this on its truck. It does its job." The LUCAS device is a system that provides chest compressions automatically. The device is put around a patient with a padded piston suction cup over their chest. Once the patient is safely strapped in, with their hands secured to prevent injury to themselves or the first responders, the machine goes to work.

The piston delivers consistent compressions for as long as the first responders need it, with the ability to adjust the rate of compression, depth of the piston and other aspects.

Consistency is vital when it comes to trying to revive someone, Brockman said.

"We may have two or three people doing CPR, everyone does it at a different rate or different depth. One guy may push harder than another," he said. "There's constant motion, constant timing, constant depth.

The machine improves the quality of chest compressions, increases the levels of exhaled carbon dioxide in patients — a positive indicator of good ventilation and sustains life-saving circulation during prolonged resuscitation attempts, according to clinical trials.

Research has shown that using the device increases blood flow to the brain by more than 60% compared to traditional CPR, which can be physically intensive, and continuing it for the minutes necessary to revive a patient can

"You do two to four minutes of CPR by yourself, you're done. And every time you stop, it's 45 seconds to 90 seconds to get the heart pumping again," Hunter said. "With this, you don't have to stop."

A representative from Stryker, a medical device company that distributes the LUCAS machine, approached Amity fire officials about using it on a trial basis in their ambulance runs.

Though department leadership felt it was worth investigating, not everyone saw the benefit of such a device, Brockman said.

That changed the first week after the unit arrived in Amity.

Using a combination of manual CPR, as well as the LUCAS device, they were able to revive the patient and stabilize her. As they transported her to the hospital, she had a pulse and was breathing.

Unfortunately, once at the hospital, the

patient did not wake up. Her family had to make the decision to take her off life support. But the family was able to say goodbye to her before that, Brockman said.

And because she was an organ donor, and because her breathing and heartbeat had been revived, doctors were able to use her organs.

"They were able to get four organs to save four different lives," Brockman said. "If we didn't have that machine and hadn't been able to get her back, by the time we got her to the hospital, those organs would not have been usable.

The benefit they've seen convinced the department they needed a LUCAS device of their own.

Amity Volunteer Fire Department had use of the LUCAS on loan through December. Now, they are collecting money to buy their own, and are working on other ways to offset the cost.

"It's one of those tools where you'd love to have it, but the budget says no," Brockman said. "Yeah, it's \$14,000, but with that run we had, even though she passed, they were able to get four organs that went to people who needed it. Figure we saved four lives what's the price of saving a life?"

changes to the PUD were needed because the developer wants to move the lots more quickly than Amos had, Mears said.

"At our trajectory, we estimate around 48 sales per year or 12 per quarter. We believe we would be sold out in less than four years. So, what has taken 20-plus years to get to 70 homes, we believe we can do in less than four years," Mears said. "We've done it before and we can do it again."

The Gradison proposal would have added 181 new homes to the town and the neighborhood that straddles Johnson and Shelby counties.

After a lengthy public hearing, the council voted 3-1 to deny Gradison's petition to edit the PUD, with council member Jeff Simpson voting against the denial.

Since changes to the PUD were turned down, future development at Timbergate is now in limbo. Unless another developer comes forward, Section 3 and 4 of Timbergate won't be built, said Dan Cartwright, town manager. All lots in Sections 1 and 2 of the development are sold, with most occupied or under construction. Part of Section 3 has been platted but cannot be built on without another investor because Amos has not built roads or utility connections, Cartwright said.

Until a new developer comes forward, the land will remain grassy space on the golf course.

Officer injured in crash

An Edinburgh police officer was injured in a car crash Friday evening.

Just after 6 p.m. Friday Officer Darren Koors was turning west onto State Road 252 from U.S. 31 when a driver allegedly

ran a red light and their cars collided, according to an accident report prepared by Johnson County Sheriff's Office.

A witness told deputies Koors had a green arrow and the driver had a red light when she entered the intersection, the report says.

Both Koors and the other driver complained of pain but did not have apparent physical injuries,

the report says. Both

were transported to Columbus Regional Hospital for non-life threatening injuries, according to a press release from Edinburgh Police Department.

Koors was released from the hospital and is resting at home, as he escaped the crash only soreness from the impact, said Doyne Little, police chief.

"He was a lucky, lucky man last night," Little said.

Both Koor's police car and the woman's SUV were heavily damaged in the collision and were towed from the scene, the report says.

Deputies checked video footage from a nearby business and could not see the accident from the camera angle, but confirmed the traffic light was functioning normally at the time of the accident, the report says.

Accidents at the intersection are very common, with one happening every couple months, Little said. Drivers should approach the intersection with caution and be mindful of turn arrows and caution lights, he said.

EMT accused of battering patient

An Edinburgh emergency medical technician was fired following an investigation into an alleged on-duty battery incident.



Edinburgh Police Officer Darren Koors was injured in a crash at U.S. 31 and State Road 252 Friday night. He is recovering at home from a mild injury. Jeramy G. Goodnight, 42, of Columbus was charged with one count of official misconduct as a level 6 felony and one count of battery as a misdemeanor.

The charges stem from a Johnson County Sheriff's Office investigation into Goodnight's behavior while responding to a car crash on Dec. 27, 2021, according to a joint press release from the sheriff's office and prosecutor's office.

Medical personnel including Goodnight were brought to the scene to examine the driver, who had some physical injuries and was believed to be intoxicated, the release says.

While inside the ambulance the driver became increasingly belligerent. The driver was first restrained with an oxygen mask to prevent him from spitting on anyone, the release says.

When the man continued to be belligerent, Goodnight is alleged to have taken his hands, placed them over the patient's

head and pressed down on his eyelids with his thumbs. That resulted in the patient screaming out in pain, though he was not injured, according to the release.

Two deputies were inside the ambulance and witnessed the incident. They immediately reported it to a supervisor, who asked the investigations division to look into the matter, the release says.

The town of Edinburgh and the Edinburgh Fire and Rescue have been transparent and cooperative during this investigation, the release says.

Goodnight was suspended immediately on the day of the incident and an internal investigation was conducted by the town, Edinburgh's attorney, Dustin Huddleston, said in an email. Goodnight was terminated on Jan. 13 following the conclusion of the investigation, he said.

Though situations like these are frustrating, Prosecutor Joe Villanueva said it is unacceptable for first responders to behave this way.

"Police and fire personnel routinely deal with intoxicated or belligerent people. This individual was handcuffed and not a physical threat to the safety of anyone inside that ambulance. Part of doing this kind of job is having a thick skin and letting comments slide, and that's exactly what should have happened here. We will now seek to hold Mr. Goodnight accountable for his alleged actions in choosing otherwise," Villanueva said in the release.

Though it is tough to investigate a fellow first responder, Sheriff Duane Burgess said the investigations team handled the incident fairly and impartially.
