Town pays off 20-plus year bond for Timbergate

he town of Edinburgh now owns Timbergate Golf Course — free and clear.

"We had a bond we paid off. We've been paying on it for 20 years. It's a really big deal," said town manager Dan Cartwright.

Edinburgh built the course in the late 1990s and built streets in the planned residential area surrounding it. The bond issue, a loan, was taken out to build the course and clubhouse at a cost of \$5.8 million.

Town officials think it was well worth it.

"The great thing about this is it's one of the highest ranking municipal courses in the state," Cartwright said. "It's a high profile golf course."

General manager Wayne Gibbs, agreed. "Timbergate is ranked in the Top 15 out of over 200 public golf courses in the state. It's an awesome thing for a small town to have."

It is also one of the four Indiana courses rated to be a "good value" by Golf Digest and the only one south of Indianapolis.

And now that the debt is paid, it will likely be operating at a profit.

"It's our first year without the bond. From every indication I have, it will be making money," Gibbs said.

The journey there wasn't an easy one,

however. Edinburgh built the course in the late 1990s with the plan to get upscale homes built around it and increase the amount of taxable property in the town. The hope was that the golf course would earn enough income from memberships, pro shop sales and other fees to pay both expenses and \$5.8 million in construction debt.

"A hired contractor managed the course for more than a decade and brought in enough money to cover expenses but not the \$460,000 annual debt payment that will be owed through 2022," said a 2013 article in the Daily Journal. "The town had to spend property tax dollars to make up the



Healthy homemade soup to jump start the new year

difference and decided to take over the course's management in March 2011."

That was the turning point, Gibbs said. "When I got here, it was losing a lot of money. We turned it around."

Gibbs, who was hired when the town decided to take over management of the course, employed various cost saving measures, as well as a marketing plan to bring in more customers, and things improved every year.

"The last two years were our best on record," Gibbs said. "The golf business is

Golf pro Kyle Dell, superintendent of grounds Fonda Sanders and No. 1 ranked teaching pro Jeff Smith all contribute to the guest experience that keeps people coming back.

In addition to golf for residents and out of town guests, the course's clubhouse has a sports bar, where people can get a drink, watch a game and even play on the indoor golf simulators, which can be used for teaching and to get a little taste of golf and maintain skills in the wintertime. Timbergate can also host banquets and events and golf fundraising outings, including the annual scholarship fundraiser by the local Sons of the American Legion. It serves as the home course for the high school Lancers golf team.

The course is also surrounded by more than 70 high-end homes, with room for many more, which contribute to the tax base and pay utility fees, Gibbs said.

Columbus Tough Mudder event to include 12-hour race

bout 7,000 athletes competed in either the 10-mile or 5-mile events at the Indiana Tough Mudder in July at Ceraland.

This year, those and other athletes will have a chance to test their endurance in a 12-hour race. The "Toughest Mudder" event will be part of this year's Indiana Tough Mudder Aug. 6-7 at Ceraland.

While Ceraland hosted the Indiana Tough Mudder in 2019 and 2021, this will be the first time it has hosted the Toughest Mudder 12-hour event. The closest Toughest Mudder last year was held in the Chicago area.

"They're very happy with the facility here at Ceraland, and they approached me about moving it here," Ceraland executive director Jim Kreutzjans said. "We're excited about bringing it here. We really enjoyed last year's event, and the Tough Mudder coordinators are great to work with. It's something new that we're doing this year, and if successful, it's something that we'll want to continue."

The Toughest Mudder will start at 8 p.m. Aug. 6 and conclude at 8 a.m. Aug. 7. Kreutzjans said the Tough Mudder organization will bring in portable lights to illumnate the 5-mile loop that competitors will traverse in the Toughest Mudder event.

Ike DeClue, director of sales and business development for Columbus Visitors

Center, thinks the Toughest Mudder might bring in an extra 500 people to Columbus that weekend.

"I think what we love about this event, it's one of only a handful that the local population can join and be part of," DeClue said. "The tournaments that we host are fantastic and bring people in from out of town. But this is something you can participate in and form a team. It's something that people here in town can get excited for and train for and get more fit and have fun with."

Ceraland originally signed a five-year contract with Tough Mudder in 2019. But Tough Mudder went bankrupt after 2019, and was bought out by Spartan. After not hosting an event in 2020, Ceraland signed a three-year contract last year that will keep the Tough Mudder in Columbus through at least 2023.

"In 2023, we'll evaluate it and hopefully continue it on," Kreutzjans said.

Menawhile, DeClue noted that the Visitors Bureau is working with a state figure skating competition that will be hosted by Lincoln Center Skate Club at the Hamilton Community Center and Ice Arena the first weekend in March. Most of the events in the community that took place in 2021 are returning this year.

"The parks are booked," DeClue said.
"Essentially everybody who was here last year are back for 2022. We're continuing to speak to tournament directors who are looking for space in town. Nothing real, real big, but stuff that would fill some gaps if we can find them."

Edinburgh sees slight drop in grad rates

The Indiana Department of Education released updated graduation rates last week.

Edinburgh High School saw a decrease in its graduation rate, from 93.6% in 2020 to 90.4% last year. Because the graduating class at Edinburgh High School is only about 50 students, having one or two students not graduating would account for such a decrease, said Ron Ross, superintendent.

"Our high school team works tirelessly with each student and their family to make sure they graduate," Ross said in an email. "We have a partnership with the Simon Youth Academy that helps provide an alternative path if the traditional path to a diploma doesn't work for a particular student. We will continue working with students and families in our efforts to reach a 100% graduation rate."

Revenue, will accept 2021 individual income tax returns until mid-April. Residents have until April 18 to file both their state and federal tax returns and to pay any taxes owed, the agencies said.

The department of revenue is encouraging Hoosiers to not file their taxes until they have gathered all the necessary paperwork to prevent process delays.

The department is also encouraging customers to utilize electronic filing, online payments and direct deposit to improve the quality and speed of return and refund processing, according to the news release.

Some eligible filers may also be able to file both their state and federal taxes for free through the INfreefile program. Participating companies and eligibility requirements can be found online at freefile.dor.in.gov, the news release said.

High bids hindering projects

Local officials are facing some tough decisions about some big projects.

City and town leaders are hitting pause, changing the way projects look or powering through them blindly due to inflation, labor shortages and supply chain issues related to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic.

The main culprit is construction material costs, which jumped nearly 20% last year, contractors say. An analysis of the producer price index for new non-residential construction, an index that looks at the prices charged by goods producers and service providers such as distributors, increased by 19.6% in 2021, according to the Associated General Contractors of America, a construction contractor and industry trade organization.

Rising costs caused the town of Edinburgh to completely scrap and spread out the town's planned \$400,000 reconstruction project at Edinburgh Aquatic Center.

The project would renovate the center's concession stand and locker rooms to comply with standards from the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The goal was for bids to not exceed \$400,000. All four bids the town received did, said Dan Cartwright, town manager.

Bids for the project ranged from \$700,000 to \$900,000, double what was budgeted. Construction companies cited inflation as the reason the bids came in over what the town expected, Cartwright said.

He recommended the town council reject all of the bids, which they did during a December meeting. The town can get by with the aquatic center they already have, but should be prepared for more costs down the road as the pool is near its life expectancy

Instead, the town plans to add a parttime position and complete just the upgrades needed to be ADA compliant. The part-time position is tentative as it will depend on how busy the pool is come spring and summer, and Cartwright hopes to pull the employee from the town's existing pool of employees to help save money. Those changes will cost the town about \$75,000, he said.

The town is also preparing for several other projects to go out to bid later this year, including a new water plant that is expected to cost about \$7 million, and a new fire station along County Road 900 South, near the town's industrial park.

Cartwright, who was previously in the construction and development business for 30 years, has not seen inflation as prevalent as it is right now, he said.

"It's crazy — with a capital C," he said.
