Boys capture MHC crown

he Lancers had a big week in the period with the fifth grade boys and the eighth grade girls earning two victories each.

The Edinburgh boys' varsity also put a pair of wins in the books including one on Friday night that gave them sole possession of the MHC crown — only the third time in the history of the Mid-Hoosier Conference that has ever happened to a Lancer team.

The action kicked off on Valentine's day with the fifth and sixth grade boys playing at Hope. In the evening's opener, the fifth graders defeated Hope, 16-12, to bump their season record to 6-4.

Scoring for the East Side Lancers were Charlie Roberts with eight and Bentley Roseberry, Brayden Burton, Kayden Talbott and Mason Burton, all with two points each.

In the second game, the sixth grade fell to the Jets, 26-17. This loss dropped them to 3-8 on the year. Max Dodson led the way with eight points, Hayden Taylor had four, Xander Pruitt two, Noah Parkhurst two and Brody Cox one.

Traveling to Seymour for a pair of Tuesday games, the reserve Lancers led off with a hard-played loss at Trinity Lutheran, 49-40, to see their record dip to 7-9.

Austin Brockman was the top scorer on this night with nine points, Tanner Kohr had eight, Jackson Hartwell seven, Keegan Smith five, Connor Ramey five, Devyn Milburn four and Jared Myers two.

In the varsity game the Lancers proved to be 10 points better than the hosts as they were victorious, 54-44 to see their record balloon to 17-2. Caleb Dewey led the Lancers with 23, Jarrett Turner had 13, Travis Jones eight, Riley Palmeter seven, Connor Ramey two, and Landen Burton one

Also on Tuesday evening the middle school girls played the Chargers of North Decatur. The seventh grade Lancers opened the evening with a 32-10 loss with Kinzie Purvis scoring six and Mya Denton scoring four. This dropped their record to 1-6. The eighth grade was able to down the Chargers with ease, winning 37-22 to improve to 4-3.

Kenna Streeval and Payton Morris were Edinburgh's top scorers with 12 points apiece, Lillie Goff had 10, and Bella Turner three.

They were back in action on Thursday, playing host to Morristown. The seventh grade girls had no answer defensively for the Yellow Jackets and came out on the wrong side of the scoreboard.

Kinzie Purvis and Mya Denton each had

three points in the game.

The eighth grade survived a late Morristown rally and won, 31-22. Payton Morris poured in 16 for the Lancers, Bella Turner had six, Kenna Streeval five, and Lillie Goff four.

Playing Morristown at East Side on Thursday, the fifth grade boys earned a victory to end their season at 7-4. In the 29-22 win, Kayden Talbott was the high scorer with 11 points. Bentley Roseberry, Brayden Burton, Mason Burton and Charley Roberts each had four, and Zyan Richardson added two.

The sixth grade Lancers weren't able to keep pace with the Yellow Jackets and fell, 35-17 to finish their year at 3-9. Max Dodson once again led the Lancer scoring with 13, Hayden Taylor had two and Raiden Stanley had two.

On Friday evening the start of the big weekend the Lancer faithful had been waiting for proved to be well worth the wait. It started off with a tough loss by the JV to South Decatur, 58-47. The reserves were thwarted by a second quarter that saw the visiting Cougars score 26 points and the good guys weren't able to recover.

Austin Brockman led his team with 16 points, Connor Ramey scored 13, Keegan Smith nine, Tanner Kohr nine, Jackson Hartwell three and Jared Myers three.

In the night's main event, the Lancer varsity did not disappoint as they came out firing on all cylinders, hitting the century mark and winning 100-73. This was the first Lancer team to hit the 100-point mark since they put 102 on Hauser in the Final Four season of 2011-2012.

They built a very impressive 29-9 lead by the end of the opening quarter, scored 32 points in the third, and posted the impressive win en route to a perfect 6-0 record in the MHC.

All five Lancer starters were instrumental in the scoring attack as all scored in double figures. They were led by Caleb Dewey with 28, Jarrett Turner scored 18, Travis Jones 18, Riley Palmeter 17, Landen Burton 10, Braylon Bryant five, and Connor Ramey four.

The win took their season record to 18-2. Saturday's lid lifter versus North Davies at home saw the Edinburgh reserves suffer through a cold shooting contest as they were bested by the visitors, 35-20. Tanner Kohr scored 11, Keegan Smith four, Connor Ramey three and Austin Brockman two.

North Davies came into Saturday's var-

sity contest as the state's number three ranked Class A team with an 18-3 record. Edinburgh was number four in Class A, standing at 18-2.

In a wildly entertaining game that was totally different from the previous night, there were 16 lead changes along the way and the final one was in the Cougars favor. In the final minutes the Lancers had a pair of turnovers and a missed shot that led to Cougar scores and number three defeated number four, 55-47.

Travis Jones scored 15 to lead Edinburgh, Caleb Dewey had nine, Riley Palmeter nine, Landen Burton five, Jarrett Turner three, Travis Vidal three, and Connor Ramey three.



State dials back COVID-19 measures for schools

State health officials on Thursday announced changes to their COVID-19 guidance.

Indiana schools will no longer have to conduct contact tracing for state reporting, or quarantine staff and students who are close contacts of COVID-19 cases.

The new guidance from the Indiana Department of Health still requires staff and students to quarantine for five days if they test positive for COVID-19, and requires people to stay home beyond the five-day mark if they are still showing symptoms of the virus. Staff and students who come back after the five-day quarantine period are required to wear masks until their 10th day after testing positive, according to the guidance.

Schools are also still expected to report any outbreaks or case clusters to the state health department, and share information with family members of close contacts so they can monitor for symptoms, according to a state health department news release.

The changes in guidance, which take effect Wednesday, come amid recovery from the COVID-19 omicron wave, which saw the most cases and hospitalization statewide since the start of the pandemic. But since January, when the rolling average of statewide positive cases topped 14,500, the number of daily positive cases has plummeted, with the rolling average at 1,610 as of Wednesday. In Johnson County, the number of daily positive cases is less than 10% of what it was in January, according to state health department data.

The local positivity rate, which hit 32% on Jan. 11, was down to 10.6% on Feb. 9, the last day data appears on the state website. The number of COVID-19 patients in central Indiana hospitals decreased from 1,236 on Jan. 11 — an all-time high — to 489 Wednesday, data shows.

The decrease in cases also resulted in the state lifting the same requirements for children in the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration's Office of Early Childhood and Out-of-School Learning, according to the news release.

The state health department will end its Indianapolis Motor Speedway testing and vaccination clinic on Feb. 26, and cease services of its testing and vaccination strike teams, but will make mobile testing and vaccination units available when requested. Indiana National Guard members will leave long-term care facilities and hospitals March 14, and no new requests will be accepted after Feb. 26, the news release says.

County OKs Edinburgh schools referendum

An Edinburgh schools referendum that would increase property taxes will appear on voters' ballots in May.

The Johnson County Election Board unanimously approved Edinburgh Community School Corporation's request to ask voters in Blue River Township to increase their property taxes to support enhanced school safety and teacher raises during an election board meeting Tuesday morning.

The tax hike would raise the education contribution of property owners in Blue River Township about 40%, to \$1.45 for every \$100 of assessed value from \$1.06. Bartholomew County residents in German Township who live within the school district's boundaries would also be subject to the hike.

The Edinburgh school board unanimously approved placing the referendum question on the spring ballot earlier this year. The primary election is May 3.

Festival Country to offer grant for temporary ice rink

Festival Country Indiana plans to offer a grant to a local city or town that's willing to host a temporary ice skating rink next winter.

Parks departments in Johnson County will soon be able to apply for a grant to cover the costs associated with bringing the temporary rink to the community.

"Right now we are just in the preliminary stage," said Kenneth Kosky, director of Festival Country Indiana. "It's more making sure we're ready if one of our cities is interested in partnering with us to test this out."

Kosky proposed the idea at a recent Johnson County Convention and Tourism Board meeting, and the board approved the grant program.

"There are synthetic surfaces and real ice options, and those can cost anywhere from \$20,000 to \$80,000 for a month," he said.

Parks departments would have to provide a space for the rink and staffing.

The grant is intended to test whether Johnson County would be a good fit for a permanent ice skating rink. It would likely fit best in Franklin or Greenwood due to the higher populations and available parks facilities.

If the trial run proves a success, then a permanent location would be a place for family, friends and, potentially, hockey teams.

"Maybe one weekend while it's there, a holiday market or an ice carving festival, something like that," Kosky said. "Winter is one of our slow times in the year, and obviously, a project like this would give residents and visitors something to do."
