Buck, Piercefield retain seats on Edinburgh council

dinburgh voters chose to retain incumbent town council members Debra K. Buck and Marshall "Ryan" Piercefield.

There were four candidates on the Republican ballot and voters chose two to fill at-large seats on the council.

Buck and Piercefield won with 30% and 36% of the vote, respectively. Ryan Blaker and Maryann Gallagher-Little were also on the ballot and fell short with 21% and 11% of the vote, respective-

Piercefield was elected for a second term on the council. Buck was elected by voters for the first time, as she was caucused in to her seat in 2019.

Both told the Daily Journal earlier this year they are proud of what the current council has achieved and they hope to

Buck, who works in human resources, first ran for election to see behind the curtain, now she's part of the team hoping move Edinburgh forward, she said.

Voters approve Edinburgh schools referendum

oters in Edinburgh have chosen to increase their property taxes over the next eight years in order to raise teacher salaries, increase school security, hire bus drivers and buy additional school buses.

Voters in Johnson County's Blue River Township and Bartholomew County's German Township voted for the measure, 66% to 34%. The tax hike will raise the education contribution of property owners in Blue River Township about 40%, to \$1.45 for every \$100 of assessed value from \$1.06. Bartholomew County residents in German Township who live within the school district's boundaries will also be subject to the hike.

The increase will cost the owner of a \$96,800 home, which is the median home value in

the district, an additional \$9.97 a month, while the owner of a \$200,000 home will pay an additional

\$31.77 a month. Translated to annual figures, the owner of a \$96,800 home will pay about \$120 more, while the owner of a \$200,000 home will pay

about \$381 more. All figures are estimates from Baker Tilly U.S. LLP, a Chicago-based public accounting and consulting firm.

The need for a referendum comes as Edinburgh schools

finds itself in the midst of declining student population, down almost 10% since the 2015-16 school year, which has resulted in about \$600,000 fewer state dollars, the equivalent of 10 first-year teacher salaries and benefits. The referendum will raise about \$700,000 a year for the school district, according to the figures.

The successful referendum was vital for Edinburgh schools, superintendent Ron Ross said in a statement.





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Tax breaks approved for Sonoco Referendum

wo tax breaks were approved for an expansion of the Sonoco Flexible Packaging, Inc. facility north of Edinburgh.

Because the company is located in unincorporated Johnson County, the abatement was approved by the Johnson County Council. Real and personal property abatements with seven year terms were approved for the company at the council's May 9 meeting.

The company, located at 6502 S. U.S. 31 North, Edinburgh, plans to invest \$2.1 million to redevelop to build a 25,000 square foot addition to the existing manufacturing facility. To outfit that new addition, the company plans to buy \$12.9 million in new manufacturing equipment, according to the county documents.

The expansion will retain 15 existing jobs in Johnson County and create eight new jobs, county documents say.

According to an estimate compiled for the tax abatement application, the real property abatement will save more than \$125,600, while the company pays more than \$222,400 in taxes over the life of the abatement.

An exact estimate of personal property abatement savings is not available because county officials determined that one piece of equipment the company had applied for does not qualify for a tax abatement under state law, said Shena Johnson, county attorney.

Under the original request, the company would have saved more than \$302,600 and paid more than \$487,300 in taxes, the application shows. The actual savings and taxes paid will be lower with the omission of that piece of equipment.

The approval for both abatements were made following a public hearing where no member of the public made a comment.

Sonoco Flexible Packaging - Edinburgh is part of the Sonoco Product Company, a 100-year-old worldwide packaging manufacturer with 300 facilities in 34 countries. The company has three other locations across Indiana: in Indianapolis, Akron and Portland. The company makes packaging for a wide variety of consumer products brands and industries that serve 95 countries, according to the company's website.

"Tonight, we celebrate an absolutely wonderful night for the students, parents, teachers, staff and the Edinburgh community. We worked together to remain consistent, accessible and transparent throughout this very public campaign to garner the support of residents of our Edinburgh Community Schools," Ross said. "Tonight, voters in our community invested in our future. We will remain transparent in the use of the referendum dollars approved tonight. We look forward to continuing to preserve one of Indiana's most historic and storied school districts."

Previously, Ross said, if the referendum failed, the school district would have to consider consolidation due to continually decreasing funds.

The decrease in state money has resulted in first-year teachers making the state minimum of \$40,000 a year. Ross said he feared a failed referendum would result in further monetary losses, staff members leaving, a continued inability to bus all students to school and further decreases in student enrollment, all resulting in the possible closure of Edinburgh schools or consolidation with another school district.

"The school provides a sense of unity and community pride. Our athletic events are packed at every home event with faithful Lancer fans. The loss of our school means no more Friday night lights. We will lose local control of our school district and a voice in what happens to our students. If Edinburgh loses its school, the town will suffer as a result. People will relocate closer to where their students attend school. They will no longer frequent the local businesses, churches (and) parks. Property values will plummet," Ross said in April. "Approving our referendum ensures that we retain local control of our schools. avoid consolidation, protect our community and property values, and ensure that the school and its programs remain a central source for community unity and pride."

Edinburgh schools is the third Johnson County school district to pass a property tax referendum in the past four years, with Clark-Pleasant schools passing one in Nov. 2018 for mental health and school security. Franklin schools had a successful referendum effort in May 2019 for teacher salary raises and mental health support. A Center Grove effort in Nov. 2019 to increase mental health services and school security was unsuccessful.

the town council made decisions the way they did. So, I decided to run in the caucus to have a part in the process. Additionally, I was very instrumental in restructuring the trash services to include monthly big trash pickup. There are many more projects in the funnel that I would like to see come to fruition. I will continue to provide the most efficient and transparent guidance on working with the team to make Edinburgh the best community possible."

Likewise, Piercefield, who is a Franklin firefighter and small business owner, hopes to continue working on projects in the works that will benefit residents for generations to come.

"I kind of wanted to see a vision for the

town and try to direct that vision. My family has always been here. I love Edinburgh. It is my community and I wanted to have input on the future of (it). It seems like if you don't have new and fresh ideas, things can kind of go stagnant. I'm really proud of the direction we have gone. We are really looking into the future ... it is not just me, it is the vision of the shared board. That's why I'm running again, so we can continue that positive movement. We are looking at new homes. We've done amazing things with public safety in the police and fire departments. We are a really unique entity because we carry so many different departments for the town."

Both identified housing growth as a goal for the town going forward. Without more homes, they said the school district and additional business growth would be more difficult. They said developers have been showing interest in parcels that could someday soon bring new, affordable housing to the town that has shrunk in population over the past few decades.
