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Whatever it takes

Versatile Turner, Lancers hope to keep building momentum

he rather noticeable disparity between Jarrett Turner's number of receptions and carries last season likely won't be duplicated this time around.

The Edinburgh senior, his team's leading receiver in 2021 with 57 catches, carried the ball out of the backfield just 13 times, but he doesn't mind whatsoever.

"I feel like I'll be used as a runner more this season," said the multifaceted Turner, who has played five different positions in his varsity career. "I like running the ball. Just whatever we have to do to get the first down.

"Ever since I was little, I've had to play a lot of positions, and I just adapted to it. I don't mind. I just do what the team needs."

Turner has lined up either as a running back, safety, linebacker, cornerback or receiver since the outset of Edinburgh's 2019 campaign. That's hardly uncommon at the Class A level, where two-way players are the norm rather than the exception; on defense, Turner contributed 34 tackles and was credited with a pair of pass breakups in the Lancers' 5-5 finish a year ago.

He also brings a combination of savvy and smarts (3.9 grade-point) average to what the Lancers do on Friday nights.

"Jarrett is a true leader, the type of kid who'll do anything you ask him to do," fourth-year Edinburgh coach Tyler DeSpain said. "He's probably the smartest kid on the field for us, but just overall, he does everything right."

With a first-time varsity starting quarterback in sophomore Caleb Murphy, the

Outlook: The Lancers, fresh off their first nonlosing season since 1993, are definitely trending the right direction in DeSpain's fourth season as coach. The roster is 29 players strong, led by four-year starter Dewey, a mainstay at receiver and in the defensive backfield. Speaking of mainstays, of the 25 men who have been Edinburgh's head coach since the 1951 season, DeSpain is only the sixth to be on the job for a minimum of four seasons. "In general, the morale is up," he said. "The administration is backing us up very well, and the program is in good shape. There's not a gap in between the youth league and the high school."

Murphy takes over at quarterback for Edinburgh, with no shortage of talented players breaking the huddle with him. Newcomers Jensen and Hartwell are expected to contribute immediately.

"I don't like to say we're going to win this many games, but we're optimistic," DeSpain said. "We're very excited about the season. We have kids who have been in the program three or four years now. It's a huge difference. They know what to expect, and I think it's important that the kids have had the same coaching staff all that time."

The winning got underway for the varsity golf team on Aug. 9 with Edinburgh hosting Southwestern at Timbergate. The girls took a commanding win over the Spartans, 205-260.

Lancers — who threw the pigskin on 62% of their offensive plays last season — are hoping for something closer to a 50-50 split this time around.

That probably means a heftier running workload for Turner — who has been working his way back from an offseason knee injury but is expected to be ready for next Friday's opener against Tindley — as well as senior Isaiha Steinke and sophomore Connor Ramey.

"Jarrett is more of a shifty kind of back. Ramey is more of a speed back, and Isaiha Steinke is a bruiser," said DeSpain, noting that his players are accustomed to pulling double duty as offensive and defensive starters.

"I don't think it's tough on the kids in general. We put such an emphasis on conditioning, and our depth is pretty good, so we should be fine."

The last time Edinburgh football fielded consecutive non-losing teams was in 1992

and 1993 with respective marks of 7-2 and 7-3. The program has never won a sectional championship and is 6-37 in the postsea-

son overall.

Considering there are 13 seniors on the Lancers' roster, Turner feels the team is in a position to reverse some of its unflattering past.

"We'll be all right. We have a lot of seniors who start, and our class is close," Turner said. "I've played football with most of this group of seniors since I was in the first grade. As a team, I would really like to get a sectional win, but if we do the right things, we could win it."

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Curly dog returns

Edinburgh staple re-debuts at original location

he Curly Dog will soon bark again.
The famous Edinburgh food made
a permanent return at Hickory Hillz
BBQ starting Monday, with the original
recipe.

Ask most Edinburgh residents about it, and they'll share anecdotes about their memories of growing up in town and driving to the Curly Dog Drive-In to get one.

Hickory Hillz owner Chad Smock, who described himself as a history buff, started researching the history of the Curly Dog, and saw an opportunity to bring it back in all of its original glory. Hickory Hillz is located in the original Curly Dog Drive-In building on U.S. 31, just past the county line in Edinburgh.

He became intrigued by it after seeing a post on social media with a photo of the original drive-in. There were over 300 comments on the post from people sharing memories and saying they wished someone would bring it back.

The original Curly Dog recipe was concocted in the 1950s by Walt Fulford, a well-known Edinburgh Town Council member and owner of Walt's Grill. He opened the Curly Dog Drive-In on May 21, 1954, and the sandwich was a hit in town, Smock said.

The Curly Dog starts with a foot-long all beef hot dog, sliced 15 times and deep-fried in oil briefly so it curls into a circular, corkscrew shape. It's then served on a double-decker white bun, topped with a secret family coney sauce created by Walt Fulford, lettuce, a slice of cheese and tartar sauce.

A saying around town is "if you eat too many of them, you'll end up over there," with "over there" referring to the cemetery just north of the restaurant. According to a 1994 article from the Daily Journal featuring the Curly Dog, "if you have to ask how much fat is in a Curly Dog, you probably can't afford it."

It was served in Edinburgh at the same location, under different owners, for over 50 years. Walt Fulford sold the business in 1963, where it was renamed to Fran and B's Curly Dog. He died years later in 1983. The Curly Dog officially stopped sales after the business was sold again in 2006 to become Hickory Hillz BBQ.

When Smock got the idea to bring the Curly Dog back, he first reached out to Chuck Fulford, Walt Fulford's son, to talk about it. He asked him if he'd be willing to share his dad's secret recipe. Different recipes have floated around from people trying to copy it over the years.

"The thing with me is is you know, I don't want to bring it back if it's not 100% perfect," Smock said.

Chuck Fulford said he's been "hounded" by several people over the years for the recipe, and after talking with Smock, he decided he was the right person to take it on.

"The more we talked, the more I was convinced it needed to come back to Edinburgh, and I thought he was the one to do it," Chuck Fulford said.

Since then, Smock and Chuck Fulford started working together to make the Curly Dog return happen. He gave Smock the original recipe, which was hand-written by his father.

They also had to spend time gathering the proper ingredients, to get the Curly Dog as close to the original as possible — something that proved to be a bit of a challenge, Smock said.

Many of the brands used in the 1950s don't exist anymore, including a specific brand of hot dog used, called "Red Hots." So, Smock tried out several different brands of hot dogs, and Chuck Fulford helped him pick the best one.

"We're pretty confident with the matching, and that we're gonna be able to deliver," Smock said.

Though the Curly Dog didn't make its official re-debut until Monday, a select group of residents was picked to try it last week.

Longtime Edinburgh residents Frank and Edna Whitlock and Brian Ingels were invited to taste test the new Curly Dog. Smock worked with Sarabeth Drybread, who led the town's bicentennial celebration, to find people in town who would be the best critics and know the original

Curly Dog well, he said.

All three of them gave Smock's Curly Dog a stamp of approval, saying it tasted just like the original from the 1950s.

"I think it tastes like it used to," Edna Whitlock said.

Ingels said he thinks it is neat the Curly Dog is coming back to the original location. People in town to this day still talk about how they wish they could get a Curly Dog somewhere, he said.

"You always hear a lot of people say, 'I really wish I could get a Curly Dog,'" Ingels said.

The Curly Dog will be a regular menu item at Hickory Hillz. A grand opening celebration was planned for Monday, with several special activities to honor the Curly Dog legacy, including an eightvehicle carhop, just like at the original restaurant, and employees wearing uniforms similar to what the Curly Dog Drive-In employees wore back in the day.

A live bluegrass band was set to perform in the evening. Free root beer was also be provided with each Curly Dog purchase on Monday, per the tradition.

Smock also got a hold of one of the original Curly Dog signs to display.

For Smock, bringing back the Curly Dog was more about honoring a community staple than making a profit.

"Obviously it's going to bring revenue, but it's more than that to me," Smock said. "It was more of giving it back to Edinburgh because it was such a staple item for Edinburgh."

Groups working to help disabled students find employment

A partnership between Earlywood Educational Services and Aspire Johnson County aims to provide opportunities for students with disabilities to gain employment locally after they leave high school.

The partnership comes from a \$551,000 grant from the Indiana Department of Education's Explore, Engage and Experience (3E) initiative. The money will pay for the salaries of two employees. A Community Employment Coordinator Specialist will work with Earlywood to identify which students might be best for certain job opportunities. A School To Work Specialist, hired by Aspire, will work with local businesses to find opportunities for students with disabilities, said Angela Balsley, Earlywood's executive director.

The grant will also pay for the Enabled Workforce Initiative, meant to train those businesses on how to support those individuals, according to a news release from Aspire

Éarlywood Educational Services assists 4,540 students with Individualized Education Plans, or IEPs, in six school districts, including Greenwood, Franklin, Indian Creek, Edinburgh, Southwestern and Flat Rock schools. Clark-Pleasant and Center Grove schools have also been invited to take part in the employment initiative, which will continue through Sept. 2023, she said.

Aspire will hold training for businesses

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to work with students with disabilities. While those training sessions haven't happened yet, the partnership between Earlywood and the local business community will help not only students looking for employment, but businesses that need talented workers, said Christian Maslowski, Aspire's president and CEO.

Countywide raid nets 32 arrests

In the early hours of Aug. 8, law enforcement officers spread out through Johnson County to arrest more than 30 people on narcotics charges during one of the largest roundups in the last year.

Multiple agencies came together for the roundup, a collaboration between the Franklin Police Department, Greenwood Police Department and Johnson County Sheriff's Office. The agencies also received help from the Edinburgh Police Department and Marion County Sheriff's Office, which served warrants to people who live in their jurisdictions.

The roundup netted 32 arrests, with another 18 people remaining at large, according to a Johnson County Sheriff's Office news release.

For months, narcotics detectives had been conducting undercover transactions and forwarding those cases to the Johnson County Prosecutor's Office to be filed. Johnson County Sheriff Duane Burgess, along with Franklin Police Chief Kirby Cochran and Franklin Police Chief James Ison assigned several law enforcement officers to work together in a joint focus on narcotics investigations, Burgess said in a news release.
