

# Crawhorn outduels Waldron, Lancers edge GCA

s the Class A rivalry game played out at Edinburgh on Tuesday night, it was clear that whoever was able to keep their offense going between the Lancers' Gracie Crawhorn and Greenwood Christian's Sydney Waldron was going to come out victorious.

And with Waldron fouling out in the fourth quarter, Crawhorn and her team came out on top, defeating the Cougars 44-38.

"We have to have Grace on the court," decade-tenured Edinburgh head coach Amy Macy said. "We've got to keep her out of foul trouble and she's realizing that. That's one thing that she's learned this year.

"She shot a lot from the outside today, but she did look to get inside more to take it inside and get on the boards. ... She's learning what we need."

The first quarter was competitive, but the Lancers (4-6) remained ahead with an 11-8 lead, not trailing all quarter. The teams largely struggled to get into their halfcourt sets, with an abundance of turnovers. GCA (1-7) found more luck in the second quarter, taking the lead with 5:12 remaining in the half, but Edinburgh and Crawhorn battled back for the lead, tying the Cougars three times before Crawhorn hit the final shot of the half to give the Lancers a 23-21 lead.

Crawhorn was Edinburgh's primary offensive creator, contributing five points in the first quarter and nine in the second quarter. Lauren Petersen kept GCA afloat in the first half with three makes from beyond the arc.

Waldron, who finished with 14 points, cashed in on a 3 with 4:45 remaining in the third quarter and tied the game up at 29-29 a minute later with a basket.

The Lancers pulled ahead in the fourth with the help of a strong supporting cast in the fourth. Bella Turner added five

points while Kenna Streeval and Cloee Britton each put three on the scoreboard in the period, edging out a GCA offense that sputtered once Waldron went to the bench.

Streeval totaled 10 points in the win. Petersen and Adeline Jolley each finished with nine points for the Cougars.

First-year GCA coach Tiffany Smith-Clements was happy to use her second same-class game as a measuring stick to see how the Cougars stack up.

"Edinburgh has a solid program," Smith-Clements said. "They're young too. But it was good; a good competition for us to see kind of where we are with 1A. We've been playing out of our class most of our games, so it kind of gives us an idea of where we stand with the other 1A schools. I'm really happy that we stayed with them the whole time and I feel good about that. We're making some progress. The younger girls are learning, and we pressed the entire game and had some success, so I think we walked away a better team."

# Grant money to be used for Edinburgh road work

Edinburgh is among 229 Hoosier towns, cities and counties that will receive a combined \$119 million through the Community Crossings matching grant program for road and bridge projects.

Edinburgh received \$595,846 to be used to mill and overlay 10 streets in town, including certain modifications for Americans with Disabilities Act, or ADA, compliance in connection with these projects, said Wade Watson, planning director and interim town manager.

These projects will include work on St. Andrews Avenue, Kilpatrick Court, Constitution Drive, Industrial Drive, Capitol Drive, Industrial Drive, Perry Street, East Main Cross Street, Center Cross Street, North Cross Street and South Cross Street, Watson said.

Small towns that received the grants, including Edinburgh, Hope and Elizabethtown, will only have to pay a 25% match due to their small population. Large cities and counties must match the grant.

Since 2016, the state has awarded over \$1 billion dollars to support local road and bridge projects throughout Indiana.

# Edinburgh man found guilty of Elizabethtown rape

While it took four years to bring a former Edinburgh resident to trial, a local jury took less than two hours to find an accused rapist guilty on three separate counts.

On Dec. 5, a six-man, six-woman Bartholomew Circuit Court jury found Teddy Albert Allman, 51, guilty of rape while compelled by force with a deadly weapon, a Level 1 felony; criminal confinement while armed with a deadly weapon, a Level 3 felony; and intimidation with the use of a deadly

weapon as a Level C felony. Allman, who showed no emotion as the verdicts were read, could receive up to 62

years in prison, as well as fines totaling \$30,000. He is scheduled for sentencing by Judge Kelly Benjamin on Dec. 21 at 8:30 a.m.

During the trial, Bartholomew County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Joshua Scherschel showed video and audio of the attack that took place in a mobile home community in Elizabethtown on Sept. 10.

While Allman made the recording himself with his iPhone, it wasn't clear during closing arguments why the defendant implicated himself with such evidence. But at one point, Allman stated the date and time out loud as if he was keeping some form of a record.

The case against Allman contained several postponements that included a dozen jury trial dates, five postponed change-ofplea hearings, and changes of attorneys.

One fact withheld from the jury was that Allman entered a guilty plea to failing to register as a sex or violent offender. Last July, he was given a 547-day sentence for the Level 6 felony, but since he's been in jail since his arrest, the sentence is considered served.
