Edinburgh natives open youth-centered venue

new youth-centered event space with a Japanese theme is open in downtown Edinburgh in the former site of a Chinese restaurant.

There are many event spaces Johnson County and several others in town, but Edinburgh parents Cody and Heather Martin had a new vision: they wanted to open a space that is equipped to entertain people of all ages.

"We've talked on and off about creating a youth-centered business. There's not much to do if you're middle school age (in Edinburgh), you have to go to Franklin or Columbus," Cody Martin said. "We finally put pen to paper when this building became available."

The spot was previously occupied by Peking Chinese Restaurant, which closed last February. The building at 126 E. Main Cross St. went up for sale in May and the couple bought it in August. After extensive preparation that included removing a kitchen, buffet tables and carpeting, they opened in November, he said.

"We have three kids, and when the first one turned two or three, we realized we would be in Edinburgh and wanted a positive experience for them as they got older with their friends and the youth generation," Martin said. "On New Year's Eve we had seven consoles set up with Nintendo 64 to Game Cube, the perfect '90s era. Long term, we'd like to see more of that going on here."

Cody Martin graduated from Edinburgh Community High School in 2005, and his wife graduated in 2010. The pair met years later in Franklin before moving back to the town they grew up in, Martin said.

For now, the business is primarily for people to rent for events. So far, it's hosted baby showers and children's birthday parties. People have already started to book events several months from now, he said.

"The month of June is almost completely booked out," Martin said. "We have more than a handful of graduations planned through June, we have a quinceañera. We can have up to 50 people for events; we don't want anyone to feel crowded. If they want to dance, we have a wood floor. It's important for us to have an open space rather than a backroom somewhere."

Board games include classics such as Monopoly, Sorry, Uno and Catan and the center offers video games including Mario, Pac-Man, Asteroids and Call of Duty. The Martins chose a Japanese theme for the event center because of their affinity for anime and manga.

"There are a few places for rentals around town, but you're renting a blank room with tables and chairs. We wanted to take it a step further," Martin said. "If a rental is having a birthday party, you can guarantee it will have kids there. Kids get bored first, so we're trying to make it easier for parents, as kids can play games or play on the crane machine while the grownups are chitting and chatting."

The event center is a valuable addition to the downtown, said SaraBeth Drybread, Edinburgh's community development director.

"(Peking's owners) ultimately decided to put their building up for sale and it's great to hear a local couple was interested," she said. "Edinburgh doesn't have a lot for birthday parties and bridal showers. It's a great opportunity for them to house those types of events in the community. They're also bringing in game nights and things not readily available for youth. It's an opportunity for them to get out and experience downtown."


Families must file the FAFSA to be eligible for state and federal financial aid. April 15 is the priority deadline to guarantee state aid for those that qualify.

ongtime comic Dave Dugan is a stand-up guy for performance punctuality. But recently, he found himself locked in a hotel bathroom with a dysfunctional lock that remained engaged no matter what he tried.

And he was due in a matter of minutes to perform before the Iowa Statewide Concrete Association Conference at the venue. So he pounded on the bathroom door and loudly shouted until someone in the hallway got into his room and rescued

"Thankfully I made it to the conference room on time — although a little sweaty where 300-plus concrete pavers awaited and before I relegated myself to more vicious banging and yelling "Help me, Help me, I'm losing my mind!" he said.

Carmel's Dugan, long a favorite in this area not only for his local stage storytelling but for his frequent appearances on the nationally syndicated "Bob and Tom Show" in Indianapolis, promises a bang-up time when he returns to The Pixy Theatre. 111 S. Walnut St. in Edinburgh at 7 p.m. Feb.

The show with \$10 tickets at the door, is Happy Place Comedy's benefit for the K9s for Warriors program that "rescues dogs to rescue veterans," as their marketing literature states about training dogs from highkill shelters to help calm struggling veterans.

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Fewer Johnson County vote centers to be used in May primary

Toters going to the polls in May will have fewer sites to cast their votes under the county's amended vote center plan.

Four vote centers used for last year's general election will not be included as options for this year's primaries: Amity Volunteer Fire Department, Mt. Pleasant Christian Church, Rocklane Christian Church and the White River Township Trustee's Office, according to the vote center plan adopted by the three-member Johnson County Election Board Thursday. The number of vote centers was reduced because it is not a county-wide election, said Trena McLaughlin, county clerk.

The rest of the sites used last year — a total of 15 — will continue to be used this year. The same four early voting sites — the Johnson County

Courthouse and the White River, Greenwood and Trafalgar libraries — will also continue to be used, along with the three retirement community vote centers: Greenwood Village South, Otterbein SeniorLife and Compass Park.

Early voting for this year's municipal primaries will begin on April 17 at the Johnson County Courthouse. Satellite early voting locations will open the following weekend on April 22, and will be open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on April 22 and April 29.

Satellite vote centers will also be open from April 26 to April 28, however, hours will be shorter than in years past. They will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. instead of until 7 p.m.

The change results from concerns about lack of turnout. For the 2022 primary, the most voters the early voting locations ever had for the 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. hour was 14, McLaughlin said.

"We don't have a lot of turnout from that last hour from 6 to 7 p.m.," she said.

The deadline to register to vote in this year's primary election is by 4 p.m. April 3.

The contract amount is \$251,300; this includes a base bid of \$248,700 and a \$2,600 alternate for replacing metal capping around the building's exterior.

The project is estimated to take roughly eight to nine weeks, said Boezeman. Workers will start to mobilize around late spring or early summer. While they plan to do most of the work over the summer, it is likely to continue into the fall but is not expected to affect school operations.

According to Boezeman, BCSC replaced most of Taylorsville's roof four years ago as a warranty replacement. This latest project focuses on an eastern portion of the roof that is mostly over the kindergarten wing.

"We believe that's a 1996 roof," he said.
"So it's held up really well, but it's considered end of life and needs to be replaced.
So it's just a portion, maybe a fourth of the entire roof structure, would be replaced under this contract."

BCSC has budgeted the roofing work through its capital projects fund. They had budgeted it for 2022 and planned to bid it that same year, but the estimates were higher than expected, so school officials decided to hold off.

New jobs coming to area

More than 40 manufacturing jobs will be created if the Bartholomew County Council approves two statements of benefits for tax abatement.

Sentry BioPharma Services is an Indianapolis-based company that serves 150 global pharmaceutical companies. Through its sister entity, SV Columbus, LLC, Sentry BioPharma has purchased a speculative shell building built by Force Holdings, LLC, said Greater Columbus Economic Development Corp. President Jason Hester.

The company tentatively plans to add 10 jobs by December 2024 with an expected average hourly wage of \$32.80.

Georg Utz Inc., a plastic container manufacturer located along County Road 250W, north of the Edinburgh Premium Outlets, asked the council tonight to approve a similar statement of benefits.

The company, which employs 181 workers, wants to invest \$22.3 million in new equipment, as well as another \$950,000 to finish out some office space, Hester said.

In exchange for the tax abatements, Georg Utz, Inc. is pledging to add 34 new jobs, as well as retain workers currently on their payroll. Those salaries will be above the county's average of \$28.30 an hour.

Town council approves mixed-use rezone

Plans to develop 18 acres northeast of State Road 252 and U.S. 31 in Edinburgh are moving forward.

Edinburgh Town Council members unanimously approved rezoning and plating the land for a mixed-use development as requested by Indianapolis-based MLS Partners LLC. Five large lots will be used for commercial spaces, ranging in size from about one to 6.6 acres, while five smaller lots, each no less than 0.2 acres, will be reserved for residential properties, according to town documents.

Next, developers will be able to submit proposals for the land. More details about residential and commercial properties won't materialize until those proposals come in and town officials review them. Speculative buildings won't be constructed on the land, interim town manager Wade Watson said in January.

There was no public comment on the rezone proposal during the January or February town council meetings when council members discussed it.

Town officials see the empty space as an opportunity for both residential and com-

mercial growth on the north side of town. Right now, most of the commercial areas outside of downtown are near the Indiana Premium Outlets or further south on U.S. 31.

With the rezone, two areas on the property will change from medium-low density residential, or R-3, to high-density residential, or R-6. A third area will go from R-3 to general business, a fourth from roadside business to general business, the fifth area will go from roadside business and R-3 to general business, and the final are will go from R-3 to roadside business, according to town documents.

Illustrations for the property show the largest area of land directly east of U.S. 31 and north of State Road 252 reserved for commercial use to fit as many as four general businesses and one roadside business.

Five lots on the southeast corner of the property near State Road 252 and County Road 650 East will be rezoned R-6 for high-density residential properties. Those properties can either be single-family, two-family or multi-family residences, but must fit the setback requirements of the 0.2 acre lots, Watson said in January.

The approval was dependent on MLS Partners meeting several conditions set forth by the Edinburgh Plan Commission. Those included providing a 20-foot utility easement around the perimeter of the subdivision and eliminating cul-de-sacs, to be replaced by connecting streets to accommodate emergency vehicle traffic, according to town documents.

Other conditions included limiting corner lots' access from public streets to one driveway and requiring building developers to comply with building codes and clear rank vegetation. Any developers must also submit their construction plans to the Edinburgh Planning Department for review before the Edinburgh Building and Zoning Department issues a permit, according to the documents.

The land was originally platted into unincorporated Johnson County as the Heckman Village subdivision in 1952 before being incorporated into Edinburgh in 1978. For decades, however, the land remained largely undeveloped because of concerns of it being on a floodplain. But an elevation survey showed asphalt fillings installed sometime in the 1990s raised the base elevation of the land above floodplain level, according to an Edinburgh staff report.

A 2.2-acre area on the property's northeast corner is labeled "non-buildable common area" on the preliminary plans and would be a detention basin to mitigate any potential flood risk.
